

## Toward greater communication and interaction among women and women's groups in the region

# The Global Fund visits Southeast Asia

In September 1991, Anne Firth Murray, President of The Global Fund for Women, and Lucia Pavia Ticzon, one of the Southeast Asian advisers of The Global Fund and coordinator for organization and human resource development of Isis International and cofounder of the Women's Resource and Research Center (WRRRC), both located in Quezon City, Philippines travelled to meet with and consult the advisers and grantees of The Global Fund for Women on the possibility of developing a Global Fund association in Southeast Asia.

Anne and Luchie were able to visit most of the advisers, grantees, selected women's organizations, pro-women donors and donor agencies

during the two-week trip that took them to Bangkok, Kuala Lumpur, Singapore, Jakarta and Manila.

During the meetings with individual women and women's groups, the consensus was that women want to work and interact together at a regional level on certain issues such as violence against women, trafficking in women and migrant labor issues, and training of women in community development and related skills. The groups felt that The Global Fund can nurture and expand these regional efforts.

In particular, The Global Fund can help create an environment and a context in which women can relate to each other on the basic reality and

uniqueness of women's lives. With this objective in mind, the Global Fund plans to continue discussing the possibilities of strengthening women's groups in the region.

Since strengthening south-south linkages is also one of the objectives of Isis International and because of its relocation to Manila, close collaboration with The Global Fund and with other women's organizations in the region offer many possibilities for networking.

The trip to Southeast Asia allowed The Global Fund a firsthand look into the many different ways it can service women's groups in the region and thereby the women's movements in the world.

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## Some Women's Groups in the Region

### Thailand

Established in 1974 as the Status of Women Promotion Group, the APSW's objectives are to study problems pertaining to discrimination and women's rights and to promote equal opportunities between men and women. Their projects include: Emergency Home for distressed women and children, SASAKAWA Women's Education and Training Center (WE-TRAIN) and the Gender and Development Research Institute (GDRI).

The APSW is presently operating two Emergency Homes which provide temporary shelter, food and medical care. WE-TRAIN provides skills

development in many areas while the GDRI is involved in academic and research work on gender issues.

The FFW set up a Women's Information Center and the Home for Battered Women in 1987. The Foundation looks into issues of domestic violence, prostitution, sex exploitation, tourism, sex market, and women's education. Its goal is to empower women by means of support programs and a separate project on AIDS.

The NCWT is a women's organization dedicated to coordinating the promotion and development of the efforts of 130 NGO women's groups in Thailand. Their affiliates must have over 100 members and be a legal group with well defined objectives and constitution. Some of their members are the YWCA, charity groups, professionals, and alumnae associations.

It works closely with the National Commission on Women, a government organization established in 1989. It serves as a liaison group rather than a program-based group. It coordinates and builds up networks. One of the Council's efforts is to challenge popular media images of Thai women by conducting workshops.
